Q. Why does RCM feel like "home" to you?

A. My children both studied at RCM when they were young. Jake's exposure to Music Theory there really woke up the musician that he would become. Music Theory is now a lifetime passion for him and I credit RCM for that.

Q. What is your first or most profound memory of RCM?

A. The memory that comes up first is Saturday morning sitting in the waiting room with other moms and kids. Remembering younger students who now have continued to pursue their musical life. The kids kept meeting up again over the years in high school ensembles, at all-state and all-county. It became a community. This was very sweet. This was a serious education and opportunity for these kids that I am very grateful for. Of course, I also remember so many beautiful concerts. The opportunity for the students to hear their teachers perform was a powerful incentive and an opportunity to hear very high level music making within a familiar and friendly context. Somehow this showed the students that being a fine musician was not something that was intangibly out of their reach.

Q. Why is it important to have a community music school in our midst?

A. If music is important to you, then having the opportunity of having a high level conservatory training near you for your children is crucial. The beginning years of training make a profound imprint on your child's trajectory over the years. These opportunities open their hearts and their ears. I am very grateful.

Q. When did you know "music is it" for you?

A. I was a musician from early on. I played flute and violin as a very young child. I sang in choruses throughout my youth, studied classically from my teen years through college and played classical piano from a very young age through my college degree. At one point I needed to choose between art and music but it was always pretty clear that music was my language and my path.

Q. What words of inspiration would you like to share with our students and their families as they embark on their own musical journeys? What do you wish someone might have said to you when you were just beginning your professional career, or when you were a student?

A. Believe in yourself. Make a commitment to your practice. Make music from your heart and soul. Do not give up. Whether you pursue music as a career or not, studying music enhances your very being, your brain, your heart and your soul. The time that you put in now will reward you throughout your lifetime. Music will be a resource that feeds your humanity for years to come. Sitting down and playing Bach will always soothe your soul.

Q. Is there someone who inspired you to become the musician that you are today?

A. Well clearly, the answer is my teachers. I have had the grace of having so many wonderful teachers. Each of them gave me a gift that became a part of who I am as a musician and as a teacher today. Mr. Fuller, Mr. Tagalino, Marshall Kreisler, Frank Baker, Milford Graves, Bill Dixon, Jimmy Lyons, Amri Galli Campi, Thank you, thank you thank you thank you.
